1. Aged, Blind, & Disabled program (ABD) provides limited cash assistance to adults with low incomes and no dependents who cannot work and are either 65 or older, blind, or have a disability that would likely qualify them for federal Supplemental Security Income (SSI).
2. Diversion Cash Assistance is a program that provides cash assistance on a one-time per year basis for families with low incomes with temporary need that are not likely to need the longer-term Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program. Emergent needs include shelter, transportation, food, medical care, child care, etc.
3. Family Support Services provide parents with aides and counselors; support to meet basic needs like food, clothing, transportation and employment; and in-home family preservation services for families that are at risk or in need of reunification.
4. Pregnant Women Assistance provides a cash grant to pregnant women with low incomes that are ineligible for Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) or State Food Assistance (SFA).
5. Vocational Rehabilitation Services target people who would like to work but have difficulty finding or keeping a job because of physical, sensory, cognitive or mental disabilities. The Division of

Vocational Rehabilitation within DSHS provides one-on-one counseling, job-skills assessments, placement support, training and education, and medical and psychological services.

6. Working Connections Child Care (WCCC) provides child-care subsidies to families with low incomes that are participating in WorkFirst activities, job search, or job-training programs.
