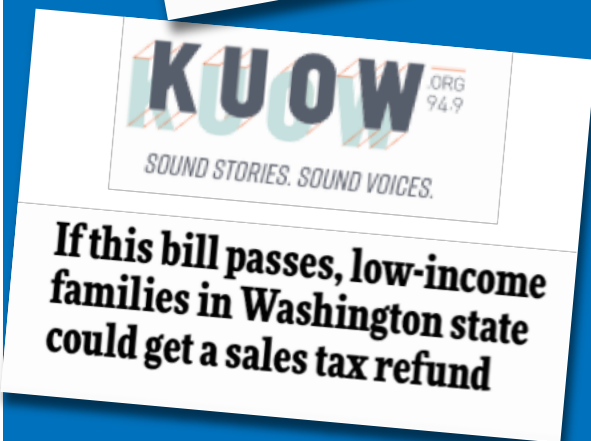
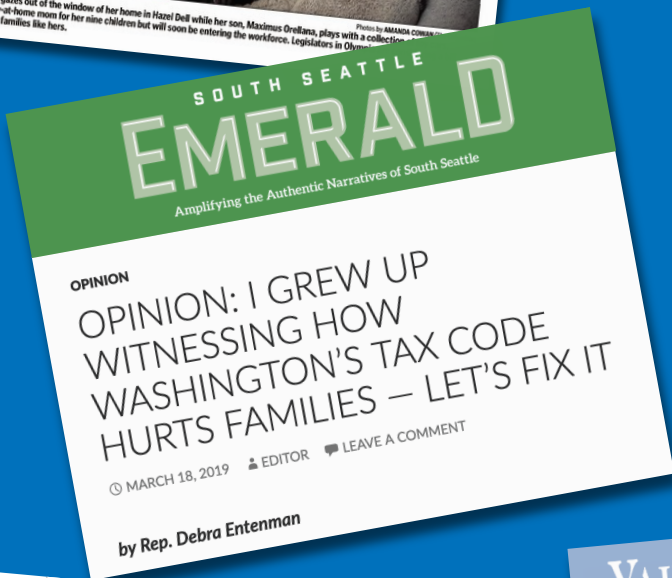


WORKING FAMILIES TAX CREDIT
